Abstract

An abstract is a 300-500 word summary of your article. Its purpose is to give the reader an idea of what to expect from your article. If your project is research-based, you may mention your results in the abstract if you wish so that the reader knows going into this paper what kinds of results the study will find. Abstracts should not be indented at the beginning of the paragraph. They should be on a separate page at the beginning of your paper.

Title

This is where the body of your paper will go. If necessary, make sure that you are using in-text citations in APA Style (Author, Year, Page). Punctuation should go on the outside of the citations. Your body should include an introduction and conclusion. Feel free to also include any pictures, graphs, or diagrams that will help readers understand the content of your article. The next page will show an example of your references page. Your references should be on a separate page at the end of your article.
